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Make your home in me

The story of the Prodigal Son is not just about physically leaving home. Sister Stanislaus Kennedy uses a moment in Charles Dickens' *Nicholas Nickleby* to illustrate her understanding of 'home'. 'Nicholas had befriended a young crippled boy named Spike while he was working in a children's home. When Spike discovered that Nicholas was leaving the home, he wanted to go with him. But Nicholas was poor and was unable to offer Spike a proper home. Spike, however, was not thinking of practical matters like food, clothes or shelter; instead, he turns to Nicholas and says with passion, "*You* are my home." [1]

What do *we* mean by home? We may not be aware of it but 'the home we are looking for is our true self. It's about being comfortable about being in our own skin and being the person that God has created us to be. There may be a 'sense of place' to coming home, but the 'sense of place' is really a metaphor. 'Home' is about coming home to who we are within ourselves and who we are in God.'[2]

'In the story of the Prodigal Son, I am like the younger son every time I search for infinite, unconditional love where it cannot be found. Leaving home is living as though I do not yet have a home, and must look far and wide to find one. The 'homelessness' of the elder son is more difficult to identify. After all, he was physically at home and did all the right things. His complaints show his resentment and anger at not being given what he felt he deserved. It is hard to return home from this form of homelessness. Both sons needed healing and forgiveness. Both needed to return home. Both needed the embrace of a forgiving father. All of us will someday have to deal with the younger and elder child in us. The question before us is simply: What can we do to make the return home possible?

Home is the centre of my being, where I can hear the voice that says, "You are my beloved." I return home in the very moment that I reclaim my original goodness, that I am God's beloved child.' [3] The story of the compassionate father is a story that speaks about a love that always welcomes home and always wants to celebrate.[3] God isn't going to love us any more than God loves us right now. We can't diminish God's love for us. What we *can* do, however, is to learn how to believe it, receive it, trust it, allow it and celebrate it. [4] We come home when we accept God's invitation: "Make your home in me, as I make mine in you."

JUBILEE 'Pilgrims of Hope'

This ordinary Jubilee began with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica on Christmas Eve 2024 and will conclude on January 6, 2026 (Epiphany). The concept of Jubilee originates from the Old Testament Book of Leviticus where every 50th year was designated as a time of forgiveness of debts, liberation of slaves, and return of lands to their original owners. In Catholic tradition, a Jubilee Year (or Holy Year) is a special year of grace, typically celebrated every 25 years.

This Holy Year is the first regular Jubilee of the 21st century and the first post-pandemic ordinary Jubilee. As the Catholic Church celebrates this 2025 Jubilee Year, it anticipates a profound period of spiritual renewal, forgiveness, and reconciliation. Pope Francis has given it the theme "Pilgrims of Hope" emphasizing the journey of faith in challenging times.

During a Jubilee Year, the Church offers special opportunities for obtaining indulgences. The faithful are encouraged to make pilgrimages to designated holy sites, offer prayers for the Pope's intentions, and engage in works of mercy and charity. These practices combine to create a comprehensive spiritual journey of renewal and grace.

The theme "Pilgrims of Hope" reminds us that renewal is always possible, forgiveness is always available, and God's mercy is endless. As we celebrate this sacred time, we're called to open our hearts to grace and become instruments of mercy in our communities. There are still Jubilee prayer cards at the back of church.
